EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S MESSAGE

Being in the community is different than being part of the community. Doing work in the community is different from mobilizing the community. For CASASC, it is so important to work in the community, but much more important is to work with the community, for people to understand why we take part in the events, what we are doing and what we can do for them.

The events that we presented showed that every day we have more and more supporters. We have more support from individuals, partner organizations and from corporations that in one way or another, are with us in this fight against sexual violence.

Although it is very sad to see the increase in the numbers of victims assisted, I am very proud to know that we have been here for them and have provided the help they were looking for. The team, their commitment, their sense of belonging has made clients feel safe and want to return to receive the help they deserve.

This year our focus was on *Prevention*, in particular through our education program: No Secrets. This program has created a partnership with Central Alberta schools. We have presented to 13,781 children, enabling them to be part of the prevention of sexual abuse.

Public education also took us into other school establishments, community organizations and groups, extending the possibilities of prevention. One facet of prevention that is very important for me to mention is the Family Intervention Program, that focuses on children who have sexualized behaviors. When we help these children with the collaborative support of the family, we are guaranteeing that they will never be either offenders or victims of sexual violence.

The crisis program continues to be at the forefront. It is a community-based program, created by the community and sustained by the community with more than 70 volunteers. We continue to answer phone calls, texts and webchats on the website, 24 hours a day, seven days a week. The number of people served this year can be seen in the infographic in this report.

Again, I want to mention it is sad to see that we have passed the 20 thousand people served, but I am very proud that we have been able to help them. It is worth mentioning that the Central Alberta Region has 400,000 inhabitants and approximately five percent of the inhabitants of Central Alberta have been victims of violence or sexual abuse.

With great sadness we said goodbye to two team members who for life's reasons decided to retire to enjoy life and family completely. Alma and Deb will always be remembered. We thank them for their dedication and work for the community for all these years.

With tears in my eyes, I want to mention the great work that Jake our Therapy Dog did during the five years that he worked with us. He became a member of the team as important as anyone. Jake was the pioneer in this office and in Red Deer. He was the only dog certified by the Pet Therapy Society of Northern Alberta.





We expressed a qualified opinion on the audited financial statements in our report dated April 21, 2020. In common with many not-for-profit organizations, Central Alberta Sexual Assault Support Centre derives a material amount of revenue from donations and fundraising activities, the completeness of which is not susceptible to satisfactory audit verification. Accordingly, verification of these revenues was limited to the amounts recorded in the records of Central Alberta Sexual Assault Support Centre. Therefore, we were not able to determine whether any adjustments might be necessary to donation and fundraising revenue, excess revenues over expenses, and cash flows from operations.
